International ‘Country to Country’ cyber security competition trains next generation of job-ready university graduates

Edith Cowan University’s Security Research Institute and technology company FifthDomain led Australia’s involvement in the first Country to Country (C2C) Capture the Flag (CTF) cyber security competition held over the weekend.

The competition brought together 150 university students in 31 teams from around the world – including Australia, France, Israel, Japan, the UK and USA – to compete over a 24-hour period.

Unlike similar events, the C2C-CTF did not set countries or universities against each other. Instead, teams were composed of students from different universities, so the focus was not which institution or nation was best, but which team displayed the best communication, skills and team work.

Students from Australia’s Edith Cowan University were among the top performers in the competition – including the team leader Tarun Patel of winning team BONTS (Team 24).

ECU’s Executive Dean of the School of Science, Professor Andrew Woodward, said the event would provide students the chance to test their skills in countering emerging attacks and other essential skills for future cyber security careers.

“With the soaring costs of cyber crime threatening Australian and global businesses, the cyber security industry is set to replace the mining sector as the next jobs boom in Australia,” Professor Woodward said.

“It is expected the global cyber security workforce shortage will reach between three and six million over the next few years.”

The aim of the C2C-CTF is to address the global cyber skills gap and foster international cooperation while aligning student education with the hands-on cyber skills required to make them job ready.

The 2020 C2C-CTF is the first in a five-year series organised by the International Cyber Security – Center of Excellence (INCS-CoE). A different nation will host the C2C-CTF each year, with Australia slated to host the competition in 2024.

Participation in this program closely aligns with Australia’s Cyber Security Strategy 2020, which commits A\$1.67b investment over ten years and outlines a range of initiatives including growing a skilled workforce of job ready cyber security workers.

It also supports Australia’s international cyber affairs and trade agenda by strengthening international partnerships that promote stability and cooperation; and by promoting trade opportunities for Australian digital goods and services.
